

WHO WE ARE

The John Fawcett Foundation (JFF) is a humanitarian not-for-profit organisation that assists needy people in Indonesia, with its focus being sight restoration and blindness prevention. JFF is registered in Australia, Indonesia, and the United Kingdom.

WHAT WE DO

JFF offers its assistance to Indonesian citizens in the lower socio-economic group free of charge and without religious, political, or ethnic consideration. The Foundation's headquarters are in Bali, Indonesia, and its humanitarian projects include Sight Restoration and Blindness Prevention, Prosthetic Eyes and Technology Transfer.

WHERE WE WORK

JFF's humanitarian projects extend throughout Indonesia, in locations where people are impoverished and medical specialist services are scarce.



JFF is a Full Member of ACFID and signatory to the ACFID Code of Conduct.

ACFID (Australian Council for International Development) is the peak Council for Australian not-for-profit aid and development organisations. The John Fawcett Foundation is a signatory to the ACFID Code of Conduct, which is a voluntary, self-regulatory sector code of good practice. Chairmen's Reports

JOHN FAWCETT FOUNDATION (AUSTRALIA)



ear friends, I am delighted to report on an absolutely fabulous year for the John Fawcett Foundation. Last year was our first full year out of COVID and our staff have rebounded from those terrible few years with absolutely renewed vigour and energy. During the year they performed 4,471 eye operations and screened 53,466 people with eye problems, both of which were near records for our team. Our equipment was pushed to its limits, and towards the end of the year we observed that much of our equipment needs renewal. For example, the operating microscopes are over 20 years old and desperately need replacement so that our surgeons

can have good equipment and provide the safest results for our patients. Also, our mobile clinics need refurbishing, and the sterilising and cleaning equipment is beginning to need excessive maintenance and is prone to failure. We are looking at replacing all these items in the coming year and all of this is going to cost slightly more than A\$200,000.

Whilst all this activity has been occurring, we've also been looking at our fundamental services and the way in which we store patient information. Currently this is all paper-based, but we have begun implementing an electronic medical record system copying that system which was developed by Lions Outback Vision and installing it on JFF computers. There's a great synergy between the two organisations, with Lions Outback Vision providing great quality care to remote and isolated communities in Western Australia and JFF now providing great care to remote communities throughout Indonesia. In fact, 70% of our cataract surgeries are now performed well away from Bali in remote situations. This record-keeping system will allow us to document results from surgery, and we plan to include screening for other eye diseases,

such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy in collaboration with the Lions Eye Institute and the University of Udayana in Bali. There is great support from RANZCO and the Perth Eye Foundation as well for this work, and for the young doctor interchange program that JFF supports which saw three Australian training eye surgeons visit and work with young colleagues in Bali last year. This helps to cement the incredibly important relationships that exist professionally between Australia and Indonesia and develops young talent which can mutually support each other's communities going forward.

I look forward to the coming year and I'm hoping next year we will report on not only the numbers of surgeries but the quality of outcomes as well. I hope also to report to you about the great improvements in our equipment that we have been able to procure. Thank you so much for all your support of JFF. The work is desperately needed throughout Indonesia, and it has a flowback benefit to our community here in Australia and beyond. Please support us generously as each and all support is so welcome and appreciated.

t is an honour and privilege to present the 2023 Report.

The Foundation are back on missions! We have returned to our full capacity in services, and, despite the financial shortfalls in 2022 and 2023, the Foundation has used the funds efficiently and effectively.

With the strong support of the local Indonesian governments and collaboration with the partners and other stakeholders, the activities that the Foundation carried out has been able to reach more people in need. In 2023, our activities included 16 offshore eye programs covering East Java, Central Kalimantan, Sulawesi, Nusa Tenggara Barat and Nusa Tenggara

Timur, our partner outreach clinics and twice-weekly village eye programs in Bali. As a result, the Foundation restored sight to 4,471 blind people and screened 53,466 people with eye problems.

One of the greatest challenges in 2023 was travelling to some of the islands in Eastern Indonesia. Flights have not returned to the full schedule as before COVID-19, and we had to use couriers to expedite the logistics, sending operating equipment, consumables, theatre linen, and other items well before the time the staff travelled. This created problems with potential deficiencies in equipment and consumables for other scheduled programs.

In strengthening our human and skills resources we are very pleased with the support from The Lions Eye Institute which provided two of their most senior nurses visit early in 2023. This input for the improvements of our services is highly valuable, not just in upskilling for our team, but also in enabling us to provide the best health practices for our patients in the villages.

Providing the best services to our patients not only involves people and skills. There are other components that we have to address, namely our medical equipment, surgical instruments and mobile eye clinics. Medical equipment regularly needs replacement and the mobile eve clinics refurbishment. These are conditional on available funds, and with due respect we humbly seek your support. With new medical equipment and upgraded facilities, we will be able to give the best services that we can offer to the patients, and it gives us more confidence in bringing the services closer to the village people.

To our donors, families, and supporters, we thank you for your donations and assistance.

International **Coordinator's Report**



023 was our first fully active year since the start of the COVID pandemic in 2020. and it was gratifying to see the numbers of people assisted in our programs growing as the year progressed. The total number of free cataract operations was very close to a record for JFF, and our team members are to be commended for their hard work over the year. Since the program's inception in 1991, over 1,220,000 people with eye problems have been checked, about 70% of these receiving glasses and 50% eye treatments, and over 68,000 have undergone cataract operations to restore their sight.

Likewise, the Prosthetic Eye Program numbers continue to grow, with the total number of people fitted with an artificial eye since the program commenced reaching 1,143 by the end of the year. Most of the patients are helped during our offshore eye programs, when our ocularist travels with the team to provide the service onsite.

These figures illustrate the increasing need for JFF's services, now offered throughout the archipelago.

The team conducted 16 offshore eve programs through the year, the most distant in Malaka, Nusa Tenggara Timur, where two separate programs were conducted.

We were very pleased to be invited by Perdami Bali to join their ophthalmologists for two surgical programs in the eastern part of Indonesia, one in Soe, West Timor, and one on the island of Sumba. And in late December the team conducted an eye program in the location of PT Sumbawa Timur Mining, funded by the company.

Increasingly, senior nurses of JFF's team are requested to give seminars covering the management of cataracts in community practice, the use of diagnostic equipment, and postoperative examination of cataract patients to medical personnel working in government clinics in our offshore program locations. This is an encouraging indication of the recognition by government personnel of the knowledge and skills of our team.

In January Dita, a newly-graduated optometrist, joined our team. Given the team's heavy load in refracting patients, especially during offshore eye programs, Dita's expert involvement has been much appreciated.

2023 saw some significant changes in the composition of the JFFA Board, with a new Treasurer and three additional Board members with medical qualifications, as well as Professor Bill Morgan's taking on the role of Chair. With this influx of ophthalmic expertise, the guardianship of the Foundation's activities will result in an increasing improvement in quality of outcomes for our patients.

CHILDREN'S CATARACT SURGERIES

In February three young Balinese children ranging in age from 2-6 years old, all cataract blind in both eyes, were operated to restore their sight. The operations were performed by Dr Wayan Gde Dharyata in the Puri Raharja Hospital in Denpasar.











WORLD SIGHT DAY (WSD)

World Sight Day, coordinated by the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness under the VISION 2020 Global Initiative, is held annually in October to focus global attention on blindness and vision impairment.

The 'Call to Action' for WSD in 2023 was 'focusing on preservation of vision in the workplace'.

To celebrate World Sight Day 2023 our team conducted a five-day eye screening and operating program in Bondowoso, East Java, with a group of LoveHeart donors attending. During this program 286 cataract-blind people had their sight restored.









BALI VILLAGE EYE PROGRAMS

Twice-weekly eye programs are conducted in villages throughout Bali, offering eye checks, glasses, and eye treatments, as well as sight-restoring operations in the mobile eye clinic.

21,203 people with eye problems screened













EYE SCREENING AND CATARACT OPERATIONS AT JFF HEADQUARTERS

JFF offers weekly eye checks and treatment sessions, as well as sight-restoring operations at its Headquarters in Sanur, Bali.

We welcome the participation of young ophthalmologists from PERDAMI Bali who assist our team with these sessions through the year.

OFFSHORE EYE PROGRAMS

During the year our team conducted 16 eye screening and surgical programs in the provinces of East Java, Central Kalimantan, Makassar, Nusa Tenggara Barat and Nusa Tenggara Timur, in cooperation with local hospitals, the Indonesian Red Cross, and the Indonesian Ophthalmologists' Association (PERDAMI).


























SCHOOL EYE SCREENING

An integral part of JFF's village and offshore eye programs is to visit local schools to check the eyes of the students, aiming to detect eye problems early and treat them to prevent them worsening.

Glasses are given to those who need them, eye infections are treated, and more serious problems are referred to the local specialist or medical clinic. The team leader also takes the

opportunity to talk to the children and teachers about looking after their eyes and avoiding accidents.

OUTREACH EYE CLINICS

The Outreach Clinic Program partners with selected Indonesian ophthalmologists who operate patients in private clinics or in government hospitals.

JFF supplies the outreach clinics with surgical consumables, interocular lenses, and an operating fee.

In 2023 JFF Indonesia partnered with Outreach Clinics in Lombok and East Java.





GENDER EQUITY: SIGHT RESTORATION

World-wide, females have higher rates of visual impairment than males but are less likely to receive treatment due to social barriers to access.

To achieve gender equity as opposed to equality in our Sight Restoration and Blindness Prevention Project, our longterm target is to achieve a ratio


of females:males operated around 60:40, which is the ratio recommended for Indonesia by the International Agency for Prevention of Blindness (October 2020). We are working towards this by proactively encouraging more women to attend screenings and clinics and holding special femaleonly eye clinics on occasions such as International Women's Day.


INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

On International Women's Day in March, JFF held a dedicated eye clinic and operating session at Headquarters for females. Six women who were blind with cataracts were operated to restore their sight.


Gender Percentages: Across All Programs



Prosthetic Eyes

he provision of a naturallooking artificial eye restores the confidence and dignity of the patient so that he or she can have a normal life, free from disfigurement and social stigma. Each prosthetic eye is custommade for the patient so that they look as natural as possible and move with the other eye, so much

so that it is often difficult to detect which is the artificial eye and which is the real eye.

In 2023 JFF's prosthetic eye technician made artificial eyes for 124 patients. The majority of these were made in the field during offshore eye programs, and 78% received their first prosthetic eye.













MAINTAINING QUALITY OF SURGERY AND SERVICES

JFF's priority is to maintain the highest possible quality of treatment it can to all recipients of its assistance. Volunteer medical specialists from Australia and the United Kingdom travel to

Bali at their own expense to pass on their skills and knowledge in cataract surgical techniques, theatre sterilisation and infection control protocols, as well as other ophthalmic specialties.

The volunteers also conduct symposiums and teaching sessions coordinated through the universities in Indonesia.

JFF CREATE

Established in 2023, JFF CREATE (Charity, Research, Exchange, Awareness, Tutelage, Empowerment) is designed to enhance relationships between Australian and Indonesian junior doctors. Under the initiative, Australian junior doctors raise funds for JFF services in Indonesia, participate in research, and engage in clinical exchanges. Indonesian doctors are offered

observer opportunities at Royal Perth Hospital, fostering a reciprocal educational experience. The program will develop further in 2024 with the first visit of Australian junior doctors to Bali.

JFFI received a grant from the Australian Government's Direct Aid Program (DAP) to support surgical and screening costs for 10 village programs in Bali conducted from March to June, as a result of which 66 people had their sight restored.



LoveHeart, an initiative of Cassandra and Adam Hudson, organises groups of donors to join the JFF team during offshore eye programs, fully funding each program visited. The visits give the donors the opportunity to witness firsthand the profound impact their support makes on the lives of the beneficiaries.

In 2023 LoveHeart organised donor group visits to two offshore eye programs in East Java, during which a total of 565 blind people received sight-restoring operations.



JFF receives support through B1G1's Membership Program which inspires a wide range of businesses world-wide to donate part of their profits to charities and projects of their choice.



ROHFC is a volunteer NGO based in Alberta, Canada, which assists international partners in alleviating suffering poverty and injustice. JFF is proud to be a partner of ROHFC which has supported JFF's work since 2014.

In 2023 ROHFC provided a grant for an offshore eye program in East Java during which 284 blind patients underwent cataract operations.



JFF continues to receive support from Rotary Clubs in Australia, Indonesia, and other countries. Thanks to the Rotary Clubs of Dalkeith and West Perth, Western Australia, for their support in 2023.

LOCAL SUPPORT

Our sincere thanks to the local Indonesian businesses and organisations that supported JFF's programs through the year, in Bali and on other islands.



KCK, a community group of women based in Denpasar, focuses on giving service to the needy in Indonesia with scholarships, food supplies, and health and other programs.

In 2023, in addition to supporting a village eye program in Bali, KCK supported three of JFF's offshore

eye programs (one in Labuan Bajo (NTB), and two in Malaka, West Timor, NTT), facilitating liaising with the local governments, and providing transport, accommodation, and food for the JFF team. Without KCK's support, these offshore programs would have been very difficult for JFF to run.





JFF's team conducted an eye screening and operating program in December in Dompu, Sumbawa (NTB) fully supported by PT Sumbawa Timur Mining.



Popular restaurant and homestay in Bali, Poppies Asia, has been regularly donating to JFF for many years, with donations from guests topped up by management.



FF's humanitarian work is dependent on donations and grants. In 2023 JFF's funding came from philanthropic

FUNDRAISING INITIATIVES

MARKETING, SOCIAL MEDIA AND COMMUNICATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE

In 2023, in view of the urgent need to raise more funds for the projects, the JFFA Board expanded the terms of reference of the Marketing and Fundraising Subcommittee and renamed it the Marketing, Social Media and Communications Subcommittee, working with a digital marketing agency in Bali to increase JFF's exposure on various social media platforms in order to raise a wider awareness aiming to generate more donations.

Since then, literally thousands of dollars have been donated to support JFF's work, initially through selling at Peduli Bali events, and later at markets, fundraisers, to her choir, church, friends, and family, under the name of Mel's Conserves.





Bali Community Choir held its annual concert in September, donating the proceeds to JFF's work. Thank you to Brendan O'Donnell and the members of the choir, and also to Warmadewa College in Denpasar which offered its excellent venue at a substantially discounted rate for the event.

Bali Hash House Harriers 2 ran a fundraising event in support of JFF in Ubud in December, raising funds from tickets and sales of donated items.

We thank Dot Lambrou for organising this event to support JFF's work.


Financial Summary







JFF Australia (JFFA)

Although the projects commenced in 1991, The John Fawcett Foundation Incorporated was formally established and registered in 2000 to support the humanitarian projects conducted by JFFI in Indonesia.

The Australian Board has a governing and fundraising role, and the Foundation is registered

with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) to receive tax-deductible donations in Australia.

JFFA is a Full Member of ACFID (Australian Council For International Development) and a signatory to the ACFID Code of Conduct. JFFA's Annual General Meeting was held in May 2023 in Perth, Western Australia, and Board meetings were held quarterly. The third quarterly meeting for 2023 was held in Bali, with JFFA Board members holding discussions with the Balinese staff and JFFI Board members and joining the team in a village eye program.


