Chairmen's Reports

JOHN FAWCETT FOUNDATION (AUSTRALIA)



ear friends I'm very happy to report on our achievements in 2024. Our aim was to raise funds to replace the old operating microscopes, expand our cataract and screening services and establish an electronic medical records system. I'm delighted to say that we have completed all three. This would not have been possible without your support, and I'm proud to be able to report that you have contributed the \$200,000 required for the new microscopes. We've also had a lot of fun this year with two successful fundraising events, one in August in Bali and one in December in Perth.

Our longstanding board member, Norbert Hoegel, facilitated purchase of two excellent German operating microscopes at reasonable prices. He has also refurbished two freestanding microscopes donated from a Victorian hospital. When these microscopes are commissioned in Bali, they will help transform the efficiency and safety of our surgical procedures. We also upgraded sterilisation and other equipment, refurbished two mobile vans and purchased new surgical instruments.

From the Lions Outback Vision, we received a donation of their electronic medical record system which they built inhouse to service remote areas in Western Australia. This has formed the perfect backbone for our own electronic medical record system. The developer, Gordon Cox, modified the system specifically for our needs at his own cost. Two young doctors who initiated JFF CREATE with our board member, Joos Meyer, implemented the electronic medical record system in Bali. Our staff are to be congratulated for taking on this significant change with great gusto and enthusiasm. Once trials are completed in Bali, we aim to expand its use offshore.

The system is fully compatible with the Indonesian Department of Health requirements and will allow us to review repeat patients to better measure outcomes as well as to perform broader-ranging screening where all data can be captured and subsequently analysed.

We acknowledge the dedication and support of our staff who have worked incredibly hard, particularly in the offshore programs, travelling to distant islands away from Bali, separated from their families for long periods of time. Currently 70% of our cataract surgeries are performed in these remote areas where the rate of blindness is high and where people who are impoverished have no access to specialist medical services.

Thank you so much for your support and assistance over the last year. I look forward to reporting back to you all next year with an update on our current and future planned programs. It is a very exciting time to be part off the John Fawcett Foundation. Please continue to support us generously as every amount and type of support is so helpful and appreciated.

JOHN FAWCETT FOUNDATION (INDONESIA)



t is with great pleasure we present the 2024 Annual Report to all our friends, donors, partners, and stakeholders.

A Balinese philosophy is belief in 'Tri Hita Karana', known as the three elements of wisdom - connections with God, harmonious relationship with the environment, and harmonious relationship among our fellow humans. This philosophy is strongly implemented in the daily life of the Balinese. The John Fawcett Foundation is aligned with this great philosophy of Balinese wisdom. Through the act of kindness, the Foundation has continued to deliver its services to people in need by giving the Gift of Sight, not only in Bali, but across the archipelago of Indonesia.

In 2024 we performed 3,635 cataract surgeries, which is 18.7% less than in 2023. A few factors caused the reduction in numbers, the main factor being the presidential and parliamentary elections in Indonesia. During the campaign months JFF had to be careful not to gather large groups of people together and had to be very selective regarding locations, avoiding the areas where campaigns were being run. Although there was a decrease in cataract operations, the prosthetic eye program was more active. Wayan Wijaya, who now has a new assistant, Dewa Astina, made and fitted 8.06% more prosthetic eyes than the previous year, a total of 134.

The Foundation is running on a very tight level of finances. The Boards, with support from the Foundation's friends, ran two successful fundraising events, in Bali and Perth. Also, JFF CREATE, established by two young Australian medical students, is showing great prospects for the future, not only raising funds for JFF but increasing the engagements and associations to the Foundation's loyal supporters and donors.

As I reported last year, the Foundation needed to renew much of its medical equipment, particularly the microscopes.

We received wonderful support from the Asian Community Fund (ACF) which donated funds for the purchase of one portable ophthalmic microscope and, through the fundraising events, we were able to purchase a second microscope. We anticipate that by mid 2025 the microscopes will be ready to be used in our field programs, and we expect that these new microscopes will be able to do the work for many years to come.

The challenge ahead is great, and the prevalence of blindness in Indonesia remains high. According to the Rapid Assessment of Avoidable Blindness (RAAB) in 2015, the data shows that East Java has the highest prevalence rate of 4.4%, with 70–80% being cataract blindness. It is still the ongoing challenge for the Foundation to eliminate cataract blindness, and we are asking all our stakeholders to work together with us in providing free cataract operations to the needy in Indonesia.

Very special thanks to Wendy Gough and the JFF (UK)Trustees who continue their solid performance in raising funds in the United Kingdom.

To all our partners, governments, donors, PERDAMI, and all the Boards (Indonesia, Australia, the United Kingdom), and JFF staff, Terima Kasih!

International **Coordinator's Report**



t the beginning of 2024 Indonesian national and provincial elections were held, which necessitated a curbing of our activities for the first three months, especially offshore programs, to minimise risks to our team and patients. During this time, we focused on Bali village eye programs and on refurbishing and renewing equipment and infrastructure, as well as implementing improvements to our medical records system.

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

Two new portable operating microscopes were ordered from Germany, one funded with a donation from the Singaporebased Asia Community Fund. Other essential medical equipment purchases were made, including surgical instruments, instrument sterilisers, and ophthalmic equipment for use in the field.

Our laundry and sterilising facilities were refurbished and re-equipped during the year. An industrial washing machine and dryer, as well as an industrial steriliser, were installed to ensure a high level of sterility in our programs.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Two of the older mobile eye clinics were stripped down and restored, to optimise sterility and increase reliability. The new equipment that was already available was installed, giving the mobile clinics many more years of service.

ELECTRONIC MEDICAL RECORDS (EMR) SYSTEM

With enthusiastic input and assistance from volunteers from Australia and the Universitas Udayana, an electronic medical records system was implemented to help track, measure and report on program outcomes. This information is increasingly required by funding organisations and is a very powerful way of demonstrating our impact in Indonesia.

Equipment to support the EMR system, iPads and laptops for use in the villages, were purchased and software installed. The field staff received training to use the software and by the end of the year the new system was being trialled at Headquarters, with plans to expand to the village programs in Bali in the new year.

RETIREMENT


After working with JFF, almost continuously, since 2001, it is time for me to retire and hand over my work to someone else. This process started late in 2024 with a reduction in hours and will be completed by the end of 2025. I do this with a real sense of reluctance, as it has been such a privilege working with the Balinese staff, admiring their skills, development

and dedication over so many years. Working closely with John Fawcett in Bali was also inspiring and I am honoured to have had this experience. Over the 25 or so years I have been involved with JFF, there have been many changes, the most significant being the growth in organisational maturity of the Indonesian foundation, and the Balinese staff, and the cooperation of medical specialists who work with JFF in Indonesia.

Contact with JFF's supporters over the years has also been a delight, and I thank all those who have given generously in so many ways - financial, voluntary effort, in-kind gifts. Reporting to donors has kept me in touch with JFF's support base and given me an invaluable insight into the generosity of people.

I retire at a time of change for JFF, and I sincerely hope that all those involved in the organisation will continue with the simplicity of John's vision which the Balinese staff always carry with them, and which has made JFF the success that it is. The staff are the constant, the backbone, of the organisation and their competence, dedication and understanding of the way things work in Indonesia is crucial to the ongoing success of the work.

Sight Restoration and Blindness Prevention

Blindness prevention and cataract surgery is an ongoing challenge in countries like Indonesia, a challenge our Foundation has taken on and will continue. The International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) estimated that, in 2020, around 3.7 million Indonesians were blind. With 65%, or nearly 2.4 million, of these needlessly blind with cataracts and 11.5 million moderately to severely visually

impaired, the challenge is a big one as most of these people are unable to seek specialist medical attention. Since this estimation, because of the pandemic, the numbers of people who cannot afford this type of treatment have increased in Indonesia.

Vision 2020 estimates that for every blind person, two people are required to care for them, resulting in three people taken out of the full-time workforce.

JFF'S MODES OF OPERATION

JFF employs four modes of operation, working in different ways to optimise the extent of the assistance we offer:

- Bali Village Eye Programs
- Eye Screening and Cataract Operations at JFF Headquarters
- Offshore Eye Programs
- Outsourced Eye Clinics

Bali Village Eye Programs

The team conducted 74 eye programs in villages throughout Bali, offering eye checks, glasses, and eye treatments, as well as sight-restoring operations onsite in JFF's mobile eye clinic.

23,362 people with eye problems screened













Eye Screening and Cataract Operations at JFF Headquarters

JFF conducted 32 eye checks and treatment sessions, and 28 operating sessions at its Headquarters in Sanur, Bali.

We welcome the participation of young ophthalmologists from PERDAMI Bali who assisted our team with these sessions through the year.

1,465 people with eye problems checked











Offshore Eye Programs

During the year our team travelled to East Java (eight times), Yogyakarta (once) and Nusa Tenggara Timur (twice) where they conducted a total of 11 eye screening and surgical programs in cooperation with local hospitals, the Indonesian Red Cross, and the Indonesian Ophthalmologists' Association (PERDAMI).
























School Eye Screening

An integral part of JFF's village and offshore eye programs is to visit local schools to check the eyes of the students, aiming to detect eye problems early and treat them to prevent them worsening.

Glasses are given to those who need them, eye infections are treated, and more serious problems are referred to the local specialist or medical clinic. The team leader also takes the opportunity to talk to the children and teachers about looking after their eyes and avoiding accidents.





Outsourced Eye Clinics (formerly Outreach Eye Clinics)



The Outsourced Eye Clinic Program partners with selected Indonesian ophthalmologists who operate patients in private clinics or in government hospitals.

JFF supplies the clinics with surgical consumables, inter-ocular lenses, and an operating fee.

In 2024 JFF Indonesia partnered with Outsourced Eye Clinics in Lombok and East Java.

CHILDREN'S CATARACT SURGERIES

Two blind children, aged eight and ten years, one cataract blind in both eyes and the other in one eye, were operated in Bajawa, Flores NTT during one of our offshore eye programs by Dr Fredy from Jember, East Java.















WORLD SIGHT DAY (WSD)

World Sight Day, coordinated by the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness under the VISION 2020 Global Initiative, is held annually in October to focus global attention on blindness and vision impairment.

To celebrate World Sight Day 2024 our team worked with ophthalmologists from Perdami East Java in a three-day eye operating program in Bondowoso, East Java.

During this program 202 cataractblind people had their sight restored.









GENDER EQUITY: SIGHT RESTORATION

World-wide, females have higher rates of visual impairment than males but are less likely to receive treatment due to social barriers to access.

To achieve gender equity as opposed to equality in our Sight Restoration and Blindness

Prevention Project, our longterm target is to achieve a ratio of females:males operated around 60:40, which is the ratio recommended for Indonesia by the International Agency for Prevention of Blindness (October 2020). We are working towards this by proactively encouraging more women to attend screenings and clinics and where possible holding special female-only eye clinics on occasions such as International Women's Day.

In 2024 54% of our screened patients and 51% of our operated patients were female.

Prosthetic Eyes

he provision of a naturallooking artificial eye restores the confidence and dignity of the patient so that he or she can have a normal life, free from disfigurement and social stigma. Each prosthetic eye is custommade for the patient so that they look as natural as possible and move with the other eye, so much so that it is often difficult to detect which is the artificial eye and which is the real eye.

In 2024 JFF's prosthetic eye technician made artificial eyes for 134 patients, 78% of whom received their first prosthetic eye. These were manufactured in the laboratory at JFF Headquarters in Bali and in the field during offshore eye programs.

To assist with the increasing prosthetic eye work, we appointed an assistant to our ocularist who commenced work in September.









MAINTAINING QUALITY OF SURGERY AND SERVICES

JFF's priority is to maintain the highest possible quality of treatment it can to all recipients of its assistance.

Volunteer medical specialists from Australia and the United

Kingdom travel to Bali at their own expense to pass on their skills and knowledge in cataract surgical techniques, theatre sterilisation and infection control protocols, as well as other ophthalmic specialties.

The volunteers also conduct symposiums and teaching sessions coordinated through the universities in Indonesia.

JFF CREATE

Established in 2023, JFF CREATE (Charity, Research, Exchange, Awareness, Tutelage, Empowerment) is a new global eye health volunteering initiative designed to enhance relationships between Australian and Indonesian junior doctors.

The inaugural JFF CREATE exchange occurred in 2024; Australian co-founders Drs Elaine and Oiang raised almost A\$19,000 prior to visiting Bali where they

observed JFF's clinics and gave a presentation at the esteemed Asia-Pacific Academy of Ophthalmology Congress.

Two Indonesian junior doctors, Kevin and Pram, visited Perth in late 2024, completing the reciprocal exchange experience and benefitting from the tutelage of their international colleagues at Royal Perth Hospital and Lions Eye Institute.

Elaine and Qiang are delighted to announce additional funding from Perth Eye Foundation which will support two new Australian doctors, Murie and Martin to join the team in 2025.

Exciting developments are also expected on the project to introduce JFF's first Electronic Medical Records system.

JFF Australia (JFFA)

Although the original projects commenced in 1989, The John Fawcett Foundation Incorporated was formally established and registered in 2000 to support the humanitarian projects conducted by the Yayasan John Fawcett Indonesia (JFFI).

The Australian Board has a governing and fundraising role, and the Foundation is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) to receive tax-deductible donations in Australia.

JFFA's Annual General Meeting was held in April 2024 in Perth, Western Australia, and Board meetings were held quarterly. The third quarterly meeting for 2024 was held in Bali, with JFFA Board members holding discussions with the Balinese staff and JFFI Board members, and joining the team in a village eye program.




