WHAT WE DO

JFF offers its assistance to Indonesian citizens in the lower socio-economic group free of charge and without religious, political, or ethnic consideration. The Foundation's headquarters are in Bali, Indonesia, and its humanitarian projects include Sight Restoration and Blindness Prevention, Prosthetic Eyes and Knowledge Sharing.

JFF's humanitarian projects extend throughout Indonesia, in locations where people are impoverished, and medical specialist services are scarce.

Chairmen's Reports

JOHN FAWCETT FOUNDATION (AUSTRALIA)



Dear Friends and Supporters,
It is my privilege to report on a year of substantial achievement and purposeful growth for the John Fawcett Foundation. In 2025, our team delivered free eye health services to more than 43,000 patients across Indonesia — part of a remarkable 35-year legacy that has now touched over 1.3 million lives. None of this would be possible without the generosity of our donors and the dedication of our volunteers and Indonesian team, who work tirelessly to bring sight to those who need it most.

THE YEAR IN NUMBERS

In 2025, our mobile and clinic-based teams reached communities across Bali and beyond through 14 offshore programs and 102 village

outreach programs. Our clinical output reflects both scale and impact:

- More than 4,000 cataract operations performed, restoring functional sight to patients who would otherwise face permanent blindness
- More than 43,000 people screened through mobile outreach programs across remote villages and outer islands
- Ongoing clinic services delivered from our Sanur headquarters to local patients requiring continuing eye care

STRENGTHENING OUR FOUNDATIONS

A critical priority this year has been ensuring that the Foundation remains at the forefront of ophthalmic practice, not simply sustaining existing programs but actively evolving them. We have deepened our collaboration with Udayana University, embedding ongoing professional development for our doctors and nurses in cataract surgery technique, the detection of additional blinding diseases, and rigorous impact measurement.

Our JFF CREATE team — young ophthalmologists in training — has implemented a new retinal imaging system, with images transferred to the university for rapid diagnostic feedback. This initiative exemplifies the research culture we are deliberately

building, strengthened by the generous support of the Perth Eye Foundation in funding the purchase and transport of key equipment. We are actively growing similar partnerships with other Indonesian and Australian universities.

Last year also marked the introduction of a foundational electronic medical records system. We are now building upon this platform with a more sophisticated patient management system designed to deliver diagnostic feedback to patients and their local doctors, and — critically — to map regional blindness hotspots with precision. This data is already informing our plans for geographic expansion, with East Java emerging as a priority region over the next two to three years.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The Foundation maintains a sound financial position. Donor support this year enabled both increased service delivery and several important equipment upgrades that would not otherwise have been achievable. Sustaining this level of program quality and scale requires ongoing investment, and we remain focused on broadening our support base.

To that end, we have engaged a part-time Marketing Manager based in Bali to raise awareness of the Foundation within Indonesia and to cultivate stronger local and regional support over time. We believe this investment in profile will yield meaningful returns for our mission.



ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This year we bid farewell to two individuals whose contributions shaped the Foundation profoundly. Winston Jones, a long-standing Director of nearly three decades, passed away recently; his commitment to our mission was an inspiration to all who worked alongside him. We also express our deep gratitude to Penny Lane, who gave more than 20 years of extraordinary service and has now transitioned to well-deserved

retirement in Tasmania. Both leave legacies measured not in years served, but in lives changed.

LOOKING AHEAD

We enter this next phase with real confidence. The structural investments we have made — in training, in technology, in data, and in partnerships — are the groundwork for a meaningfully larger footprint. Our ambition is to reach every preventable and treatable cause of blindness

in Indonesia, and to do so in a systematic, evidence-driven way.

We are profoundly grateful for your past generosity and hope you will continue your support with confidence that every contribution is amplified through the dedication of our team and the strength of our growing partnerships. Together, we are making a difference that is both immediate and enduring.

JOHN FAWCETT FOUNDATION (INDONESIA)



It is my honour to present this report on behalf of the entire JFF Bali team for the year 2025. None of what we have achieved would be possible without your generosity, and we remain deeply grateful for your continued commitment to our mission of renewing hope, uplifting lives, and restoring sight across Indonesia.

2025 was a year of meaningful growth. We reached more patients, delivered more surgeries, and strengthened the foundations of our program — both technically and institutionally. The numbers speak clearly, but behind each one is a person who can now see their family, return to work, or simply navigate the world with dignity.

Total cataract surgeries in 2025 reached 4,179 — a significant recovery and increase on the 3,635 recorded in 2024, when election restrictions curtailed offshore programs during the first quarter. The prosthetic eye program also continued to grow, with 140 eyes made and fitted compared to 134 in 2024.

The offshore program remains the cornerstone of our outreach efforts. The combination of partnerships with local medical facilities and the mobile eye clinic van has significantly increased the number of cataract surgeries performed in remote areas where specialist medical services are otherwise inaccessible.

DIGITAL SYSTEM & SUPPORTING TECHNOLOGY

Building on the EMR system implemented in 2024 with the support of Lions Outback Vision and the Universitas Udayana, the Foundation continued the rollout and refinement of electronic medical records across all programs in 2025. The system is fully compatible with Indonesian Department of Health requirements and allows the team to track repeat patients, measure outcomes, and capture screening data in a format that supports future research and reporting.

The inclusion of retinal cameras in the program marks an important expansion of the Foundation's screening capabilities, enabling the team to detect and monitor conditions including diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, and age-related macular degeneration.

The two new portable operating microscopes procured in 2024 were commissioned and deployed in 2025, improving surgical efficiency and safety across both the headquarters and field programs.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The achievements of 2025 are a testament to the dedication and professionalism of the entire JFF team. Our staff travel for a large proportion of the year, often away from their families for extended periods, to bring eye health services to those who would otherwise never receive them. We enter 2026 with renewed purpose, stronger systems, and a growing team of partners committed to the same goal. With your continued support, we will keep reaching further, restoring sight, and breaking the poverty cycle caused by blindness.

Sight Restoration and Blindness Prevention

Blindness prevention and cataract surgery is an ongoing challenge in countries like Indonesia, a challenge our Foundation has taken on and will continue. The International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) estimated that, in 2020, around 3.7 million Indonesians were blind. With 65%, or nearly 2.4 million, of these needlessly blind with cataracts and 11.5 million moderately to severely visually

impaired, the challenge is a big one, as most of these people are unable to seek specialist medical attention. Since this estimation, the number of people who cannot afford this type of treatment has increased in Indonesia.

Vision 2020 estimates that for every blind person, two people are required to care for them, resulting in three people taken out of the full-time workforce.

JFF'S MODES OF OPERATION

JFF employs four modes of operation, working in different ways to optimise the extent of the assistance we offer:

- Bali Village Eye Programs
- Headquarters eye screening and operating sessions
- Offshore Eye Programs
- Outsourced Eye Clinics



Headquarters eye screening and operating sessions

JFF provided 90 days of eye checks and treatment sessions, and 89 operating sessions at its Headquarters in Sanur, Bali.

We welcomed the participation of young ophthalmologists from PERDAMI Bali who assisted our team with these sessions throughout the year.



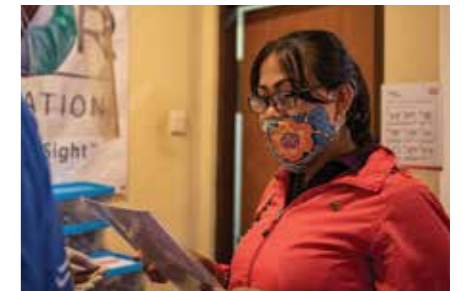

Bali Village Eye Programs

In 2025, the team conducted 102 eye programs in villages, remote and local, throughout Bali, offering eye checks, glasses, and eye treatments, as well as sight-restoring operations onsite in JFF's mobile eye clinic.

Offshore Eye Programs

During the year the JFF team travelled with the mobile clinics to 14 offshore locations and they conducted a total of 25,649 eye screening and 2,910 surgical programs in cooperation with local hospitals, the Indonesian Red Cross, and the Indonesian Ophthalmologists' Association (PERDAMI).

Outsourced Eye Clinics



The Outsourced Eye Clinic Program partners with selected Indonesian ophthalmologists who operate in private clinics or in government hospitals.

JFF supplies the clinics with surgical consumables, intraocular lenses, and operating fees.

In 2025, JFF Indonesia partnered with Outsourced Eye Clinics in Lombok and East Java.

School Eye Screening

An integral part of JFF's village and offshore eye programs is to visit local schools to check the eyes of the students, aiming to detect eye problems early and treat them to prevent them worsening.

Glasses are given to those who need them, eye infections are treated, and more serious problems are referred to the

local specialist or medical clinic. The team leader also takes the opportunity to talk to the children and teachers about looking after their eyes and avoiding accidents.

CHILDREN'S CATARACT SURGERIES

Eleven children with cataracts were identified during our Offshore Programs, and the surgeries were performed accordingly during the visit. Additionally, three children with cataracts underwent surgical treatment at RS Puri Raharja, Bali. In total, fourteen cataract surgeries on pediatric patients have been successfully conducted this year.

WORLD SIGHT DAY (WSD)

SpM (K) in recognition of his unwavering dedication and invaluable support to JFF since its inception.



GENDER EQUITY: SIGHT RESTORATION

World-wide, females have higher rates of visual impairment than males but are less likely to receive treatment due to social barriers to access.

To achieve gender equity as opposed to equality in our Sight Restoration and Blindness

Prevention Project, our long-term target is to achieve a ratio of females:males operated around 60:40, which is the ratio recommended for Indonesia by the International Agency for Prevention of Blindness (October 2020). We are working towards this by proactively encouraging more

women to attend screenings and clinics and where possible holding special female-only eye clinics on occasions such as International Women's Day.

In 2025 49.7% of our screened patients and 49.8% of our operated patients were female.

Prosthetic Eyes

The provision of a natural-looking artificial eye restores the confidence and dignity of the patient so that they can have a normal life, free from disfigurement and social stigma. Each prosthetic eye is custom-made for the patient so that they look as natural as possible and move with the other eye, so much so that it is often difficult to detect which is the artificial eye and which is the real eye.

In 2025 JFF's prosthetic eye technician made prosthetic eyes for 140 patients, 62% of whom received their first prosthetic eye. These were manufactured in the laboratory at JFF Headquarters in Bali and in the field during offshore eye programs.

Knowledge Sharing & Volunteers

MAINTAINING QUALITY OF SURGERY AND SERVICES

JFF's priority is to maintain the highest possible quality of treatment it can to all recipients of its assistance. Volunteer medical specialists from Australia and the United Kingdom travel to

Bali at their own expense to pass on their skills and knowledge in cataract surgical techniques, theatre sterilisation and infection control protocols, as well as other ophthalmic specialties.

The volunteers also conduct symposiums and teaching sessions coordinated through the universities in Indonesia.

JFF CREATE - 2025

Established in 2023, JFF CREATE (*Charity, Research, Exchange, Awareness, Tutelage, Empowerment*) is a new global eye-health volunteering initiative designed to strengthen relationships between Australian and Indonesian junior doctors. The inaugural JFF CREATE exchange occurred in 2024, with Australian co-founders Drs Elaine Ong and Qiang Li spending time in Bali and rolling out JFF's first electronic medical record. With ongoing support from the Perth Eye Foundation, Drs Martin Hein and Murie Sundravel joined the team in 2025, leading a capstone project of their own, which involved integration of retinal camera screening into JFF's activities. This important technology will capture crucial



epidemiological data, enable diagnosis of diabetic eye disease and glaucoma, and form the foundation for significant clinical and research outcomes.

The JFF CREATE volunteering program provides its participants the opportunity to broaden their ophthalmic knowledge from experienced colleagues and local healthcare providers. This two-way exchange between Australian and



Indonesian doctors helps build lasting bilateral connections and provides a framework for cultural and clinical learning that can empower the ophthalmologists of the future to continue addressing eye health inequity. As part of the program's ongoing expansion, four more Australian junior doctors have joined the team in 2026, along with their Indonesian counterparts, with an exciting agenda for the year ahead.

Fundraising

JFF's humanitarian work is dependent on donations and grants. In 2025 JFF's funding came from philanthropic foundations and organisations, governments, individual and corporate donors, and bequests. We are greatly indebted to all these sources of income, which enable us to continue our assistance to the underprivileged in Indonesia.

One of our long-term supporters, Adam Hudson, along with Unemployable Media, raised more than \$400,000 for JFF programs in 2025.

The funds received have had an enormous impact on the delivery of offshore programs, particularly in East Java in 2025, a region that Adam has visited many times over

the years and will continue to support JFF programs in 2026.

In addition to the amazing contribution of funds, which has an enormous impact in remote areas, they have also raised considerable awareness of JFF, the eye health programs, and the ongoing need for services throughout Indonesia.

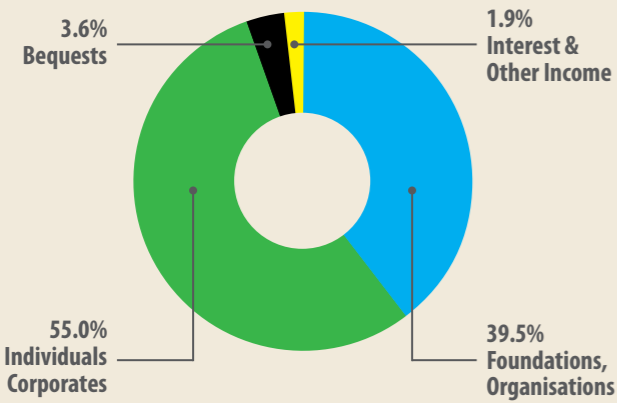

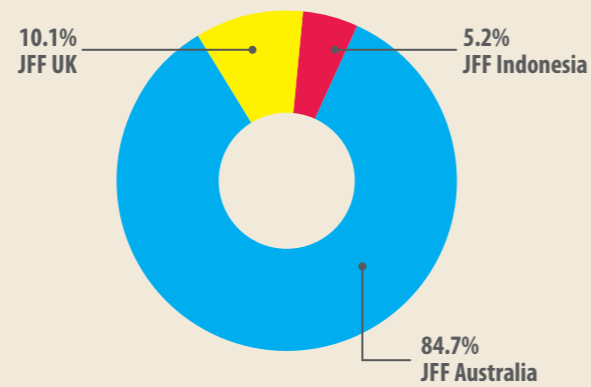

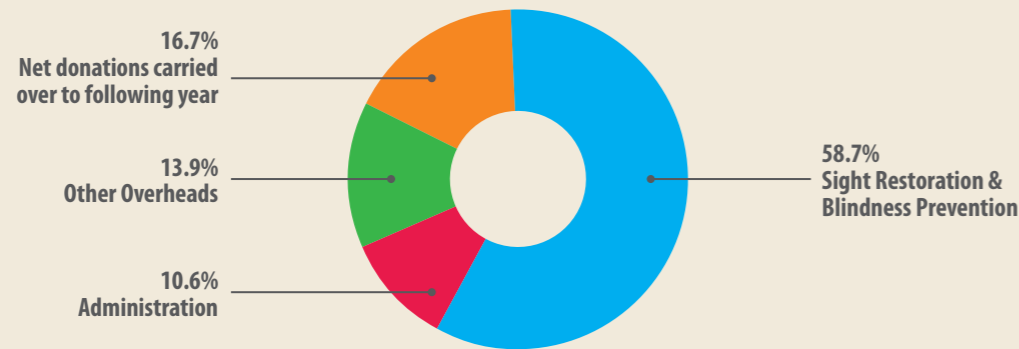
SOURCE OF DONATIONS



DONATIONS RECEIVED BY COUNTRY



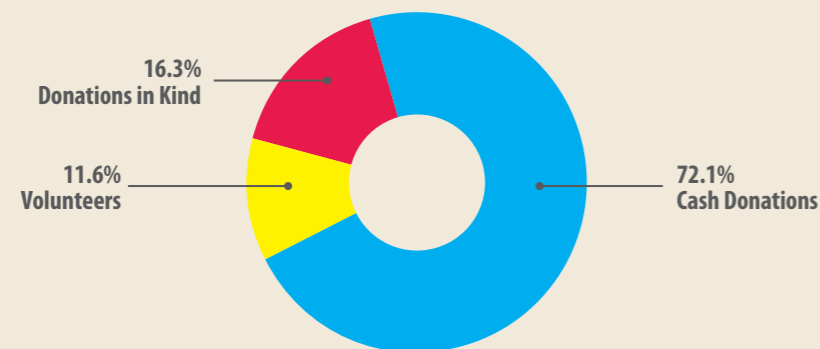

Although the original projects commenced in 1989, The John Fawcett Foundation Incorporated was formally established and registered in 2000 to support the humanitarian projects which were then formally conducted by Yayasan John Fawcett Indonesia (JFFI).

The Australian Board has a governing and fundraising role, and the Foundation is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) to receive tax-deductible donations in Australia. JFFA's Annual General Meeting was held in April 2025 in Perth, Western

Australia, and Board meetings were held quarterly. The third quarterly meeting for 2025 was held at the Headquarters in Sanur, providing JFFA Board members with the opportunity to meet with JFFI staff and Board members, and to visit a Bali village eye health program.
